



## FACT SHEET FOR THE KENYA COASTAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

The objectives of KCDP are being achieved through the provision of institutional investments in capacity building and infrastructure development, capacity building interventions at the community level and the implementation of community driven development projects.

### Achievements in infrastructure development

1. Extension of the Marine and Oceans Center in Mombasa
2. Construction in Mombasa of the Centre for Monitoring, Control and Surveillance of fishing activities
3. Renovation of Shimoni Landing site and renovation of Ice plant at Kibuyuni fish landing Banda
4. Construction of Farmers Resource Center in Lamu
5. Planned Construction of a Floating Jetty in Shimoni
6. Construction of a NEMA Green Point Center

Total investment in institutional infrastructure = Ksh 379 M  
The infrastructure is 90% complete

<p><b>Improved management systems, guidelines and biodiversity strategies</b> This is aimed at improving the sound management and regeneration of natural resources and biodiversity in the coastal and marine environment. <p><b>Revenue generation to the Government of Kenya (GOK) from near shore and EEZ fisheries</b> This is aimed at increasing the benefits and revenue generation derived from coastal fisheries</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Activities that have been carried out which contributed to increase in revenue generation include licensing of vessels, frame survey, patrols and port state measures.</li> </ul>
